

#### **MINISTER'S LETTER**

Lieutenant-General Sir Norman Arthur KCB CVO died shortly before Christmas at the age of 92. He was Governor of Edinburgh Castle from 1985 to 1988 and his banner hangs in the King David Aisle of Canongate Kirk. On the other side of the Kirk hangs a Regimental Standard of the Royal Scots Dragoon Guards, which Norman Arthur commanded in the early seventies. As befits a true cavalry officer, he had also formed part of the British Equestrian team competing in the Olympic Games in Rome in 1960. These two strands of his life – horses and the army – came together rather wonderfully on the castle esplanade when he was installed as Governor of Edinburgh Castle on horseback. It is reported that when he crossed the drawbridge at the end of the installation ceremony, the applause from the spectators suddenly unsettled his horse, a grey called Blitz. But the Olympian rider hadn't lost his touch and the Governor stayed firmly in the saddle!

It's a striking image that reminds me of the famous entry of the victorious General Edmund Allenby not on horseback but on foot through the Jaffa Gate into the Old City of Jerusalem in December 1917. He quite deliberately chose to walk as a mark of respect for the holy city, and in humble acknowledgement of the one who had once made his own triumphal entry into Jerusalem, riding on a donkey.

Easter is relatively early this year – Sunday 31<sup>st</sup> March – so as a result Lent starts earlier than usual too. Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday fall on 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> February respectively. The penitential season of Lent, which comes to an end with our own humble acknowledgement of the one who once made his triumphal entry into Jerusalem, riding on a donkey, on Palm Sunday, calls for a degree of humility from the start, as we prepare once again to follow in his footsteps all the way to the cross and beyond.

When I survey the wondrous cross, on which the Prince of Glory died, My richest gain I count but loss, and pour contempt on all my pride.

# HONOURS OF SCOTLAND

The very accurate replica of the Honours of Scotland on our Palace pew is a familiar sight in Canongate Kirk, and was featured on our latest Christmas card. The real Honours, the centre piece of which is the Crown of Scotland crafted of gold and silver and laden with 94 pearls and 43 gemstones, are housed in Edinburgh Castle and have recently undergone the most significant conservation work in their history. Carried out by Historic Environment Scotland, this painstaking work has ensured the Honours can continue to play an active role in Scottish ceremonial events for many years to come.
